**NCAA 1-AA NAT. OFFENSIVE, ION GRANT, SR. QB. 6'3, 200. UC DAVIS.** Grant recorded his seventh career 300-yard passing game (324) while throwing a career-best five touchdowns in UC Davis 45-0 shutout over Montana State. He threw a trio of touchdown passes to WR Tony Kays. Grant completed 23-of-38 passes for 324 yards and five touchdowns. He also gained four yards on four carries.  
**NCAA 1-AA NAT. OFFENSIVE, JAROD RUCKER, JR. QB. 5'11, 185. BETHUNE-COOKMAN COLLEGE.** Rucker led the Wildcats to a 45-21 victory at South Carolina State, as he completed 22-of-27 passes for a career-high 367 yards and five touchdowns. His five-touchdown performance tied former Wildcats' greats Bernard Hawk and J.D. Hall for touchdowns in a game...  
**NCAA 1-AA NAT. DEFENSIVE, DERRICK PARROTT, JR. CB. 6'0, 195. MURRAY STATE UNIVERSITY.** Parrott did a little of everything to help the Racers earn their first win of the season. Parrott sealed the victory for MSU when he forced a fumble in the fourth quarter and then picked it up and raced 25 yards to end zone. He also blocked an extra point attempt, had two pass breakups and recorded 6.5 tackles.  
**NCAA 1-AA NAT. OFFENSIVE, DAMIAN PERKINS, SO. LB. 6'2, 212. STEPHEN F. AUSTIN STATE UNIVERSITY.** Perkins had an outstanding performance in SFA's loss to PAC-10 foe Arizona, 28-10. He was involved in almost every defensive stop for the "Jacks, finishing the night with a career-high 23 tackles. He also picked off his first career interception against the Wildcats.  
**NCAA 1-AA NAT. DEFENSIVE, CAMERON SISKOWIC, SR. LB. 6'2, 225. ILLINOIS STATE UNIVERSITY.** Siskowic finished with a career-high 22 tackles. He also registered a forced fumble and a quarterback hurry. His tackle total was the most by a Redbird since Gean Gilot notched 23 stops against Western Kentucky in 2003.  
**NCAA 1-AA NAT. DEFENSIVE, JEFF WHEELER, SR. DB. 6'1, 180. NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY.** Wheeler tied a Division 1-AA record when he returned two interceptions for touchdowns in Northern Arizona's 66-14 win over Dixie College. Wheeler returned an interception 22 yards for a score in the first quarter. His second interception resulted in a 27-yard return for a score. Wheeler also had five tackles.  
**NCAA 1-AA NAT. SPECIAL TEAMS, ERIC DAVIS, SO. KR. 6'0, 180. MISSOURI STATE UNIVERSITY.** Davis returned a punt 88 yards for the Bears first touchdown of the game. He also ran back two kickoffs for 31 yards and had one pass reception for 22 yards for a total of 141 all-purpose yards. His punt return was the longest in history, easily bettering the 71-yard return by Chuck Calhoun in 1991 versus Western Illinois.  
**NCAA 1-AA NAT. SPECIAL TEAMS, COREY GRAHAM, SR. PR. 6'0, 190. UNIVERSITY OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.** Graham returned a punt 51 yards for a touchdown as New Hampshire defeated Stony Brook 62-7. He totaled 75 yards on five punt returns in the contest. He also registered six tackles and a pair of pass breakups.  
**NCAA 1-AA NAT. SPECIAL TEAMS, DAVID SIMONHOFF, SR. P. 6'2, 200. SOUTHEAST MISSOURI STATE UNIVERSITY.** Simonhoff punted eight times for an average of 51.2 yards per punt in Southeast Missouri's loss to Jacksonville State. He had five punts go over 50 yards, including two over 60 yards, with a long of 66 yards. He

currently leads all of 1-AA football with a season average of 48.29 yards per punt.  
**NCAA 1-AA NAT. OFFENSIVE LINEMAN, DERON BARNES, SO. OC. 6'1, 290. FLORIDA A&M UNIVERSITY.** Barnes anchored an offensive line that accumulated 513 yards of total offense (374 passing, 139 rushing). He received a 100-percent grade from his coaches, collecting five pancake blocks and six knockdown field blocks during the game.  
**NCAA 1-AA NAT. OFFENSIVE LINEMAN, CHRIS SULLIVAN, SR. OL. 5'11, 265. WESTERN KENTUCKY UNIVERSITY.** Sullivan graded out at a season-best 90 percent against Chattanooga, as WKU posted 355 total yards and 28 points, both the highest total of the year, in the Hilltoppers' 28-21 victory over Chattanooga. He received a 91 percent production grade and recorded a team-best 12 pancake blocks while not allowing a sack or being called for a penalty. Sullivan's efforts helped the Toppers gain 174 yards on the ground against a UTC defense that came into the contest allowing only 79 rushing yards per contest  
**NCAA 1-AA MID-MAJOR NAT. OFFENSIVE, JOSH JOHNSON, JR. QB. 6'3, 195. UNIVERSITY OF SAN DIEGO.** Johnson completed 28-of-35 passes for 345 yards and four touchdowns, leading San Diego to a 43-17 victory at Yale. Johnson also added 70 yards on eight carries, including a 46-yard scamper for a touchdown. He finished the night with a 200.51 pass efficiency rating. His 415yards total offense is second most in 1-A A this season  
**NCAA 1-AA MID-MAJOR NAT. DEFENSIVE, COLIN DISCH, JR. LB. 6'2, 220. UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY.** Disch collected a game-high 15 tackles, including nine in the second half. He helped the Great Danes defeat nationally-ranked Delaware 17-10. Disch helped stop a fourth-quarter possession with just over four minutes remaining by forcing the Delaware quarterback, Joe Flacco, into throwing an incomplete pass on a third-down blitz. The reigning NEC Defensive Player of the Year currently leads the league with 14.3 tackles per game.  
**NCAA 1-AA MID-MAJOR NAT. DEFENSIVE, FAROD MUHAMMAD, SR. DB. 5'11, 175. CENTRAL CONNECTICUT STATE UNIVERSITY.** Muhammad had the best performance of his career in a 29-26 win over Southern Connecticut State on defense and on special teams. With CCSU trailing 10-0 to the Owls, he blocked a punt and gave CCSU possession at the SCSU 20-yard line. Three plays later, the Blue Devils cut the lead to 10-7 on an 11-yard Justise Hairston touchdown run. On defense, Muhammad had a career and game-high 18 tackles (13 solo). He also added a pass breakup.  
**NCAA 1-AA MID-MAJOR NAT. SPECIAL TEAMS, DONOVAN CURRY, FR. K. 6'2, 175. JACKSONVILLE (FL) UNIVERSITY.** Curry was responsible for more than half of Jacksonville's points in a 41-13 loss at Southeastern Louisiana. He converted both his field-goal attempts, a 23-yard kick which gave JU an early lead, and later a longer 37-yard attempt. He added a PAT kick on the Dolphins lone touchdown.  
**NCAA 1-AA MID-MAJOR NAT. SPECIAL TEAMS, PIOTR CZECH, SO. DE. 6'3, 245. WAGNER COLLEGE.** Czech accounted for eight of Wagner points converting on all five extra points, plus adding a 27 yard field goal. He put Wagner up 3-0 on their first drive of the game w--ith a 27 yard kick. He also averaged 37.2 yards on four punts as Wagner defeated Marist 38-7.

**Players**  
**NCAA II NAT. OFFENSIVE, JOIQUE BELL, R-FR. RB. 6'0, 213. WAYNE STATE (MD) UNIVERSITY.** Bell broke an 18-year old school record by rushing for 318 yards on 26 carries (12.2 yards per carry). The previous mark of 314 was set by Randy Holmes on September 7, 1988, in a 48-17 Tartar win at Valparaiso. Bell also broke the school mark for all-purpose yards in a game with 386 (318 rushing, 23 receiving, 45 kickoff returns).  
**NCAA II NAT. OFFENSIVE, DWAYNE CROKER, JR. WR. 5'10, 180. UPPER IOWA UNIVERSITY.** Croker had 14 receptions for 264 yards and two touchdowns in upper Iowa's 36-34 loss to Wisconsin-Stout. He also had one carry for 16 yards and converted a two-point conversion on an end-around. The 14 receptions set a new Upper Iowa single-game record for receptions.  
**NCAA II NAT. OFFENSIVE, JOE WINTERS, SR. QB. 6'3, 205. UNIVERSITY OF MISSOURI AT ROLLA.** Winters had 359 yards passing in a 49-7 win over Lincoln University, giving the Miners their first win of the season and their first GLFC win this year. Winters, the GLFC leading passer, connected on 19-of-37 passes and a school record six touchdowns.  
**NCAA II NAT. OFFENSIVE, DANNY WOODHEAD, JR. TB. 5'9, 200. CHADRON STATE COLLEGE.** Woodhead carried the Eagles to their third straight win, this time against Wayne State (NE), on the road, 38-14. He had a career-high 324 yards rushing against Wayne State on 33 carries (9.8 average). He also rushed for four touchdowns.  
**NCAA II NAT. DEFENSIVE, SEAN SMITH, SR. S. 5'11, 210. BENTLEY COLLEGE.** Smith had three interceptions and also recorded a team-high 11 tackles and two pass breakups in a 21-18 loss at American International. He returned one interception 34 yards to the AIC four yard line, and made another in the endzone.  
**NCAA II NAT. SPECIAL TEAMS, BEN BOSWELL, SR. P. 6'0, 179. WASHBURN UNIVERSITY.** Boswell averaged 42.1 yards per punt on seven kicks as No. 25 Washburn downed No. 19 Central Missouri State, 14-10. He had three kicks of more than 50 yards, including a 51-yard yard boot into a stiff wind which pinned CMSU on its own 18-yard line with two minutes left on the game. Boswell also nailed a career-best 70-yard kick.  
**NCAA II NAT. SPECIAL TEAMS, WAYNE DURHAM, JR. K/P. 6'4, 180. ADAMS STATE UNIVERSITY.** Durham was 2-for-3 on field goals, missing his first attempt of the year, a 52-yarder. He also punted the ball four times for 176 yards, a 44.0-yard average, with along of 53 yards. He was a perfect 2-for-2 on PAT attempts. Durham leads the conference in punting average and is second in scoring.  
**NCAA II NAT. SPECIAL TEAMS, ANTHONY RODRIGUES, SR. P. 6'0, 180. UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS AT MONTICELLO.** Rodrigues booted five punts for 241 total yards for a 48.2 average. He blasted a 68-yard punt and also pinnned Ouachita Baptist inside the 20-yard line four times as UA-M defeated OBU 27-6.  
**NCAA II NAT. OFFENSIVE LINEMAN, ANTHONY DRIVER, JR. OG. 6'2, 327. TUSKEGEE UNIVERSITY.** Driver helped TU generate 408 yards of total offense (160 rushing, 248 passing) with no quarterback sacks as TU defeated Benedict 41-14.  
**NCAA III NAT. OFFENSIVE, JOSH BREHM, SR. QB. 6'2, 220. ALMA COLLEGE.** Brehm accounted for more than 400 yards of total offense as the Scots defeated UW-Eau Claire 33-30 in overtime. He completed 36-of-57 passes

for 358 yards and three touchdowns with no interceptions. He also rushed for two touchdowns gaining 76 yards on 24 carries.  
**NCAA III NATIONAL OFFENSIVE, JASON VRABLE, SR. QB. 6'0, 205. MARIETTA COLLEGE.** Vrabre threw for a career-high 405 yards, five shy of the school record, in Marietta's 37-31 overtime comeback win against Baldwin-Wallace. He had touchdown throws of 18, 65, 4 and 4 yards. He completed 24-of-36 passes for 374 yards and had nine carries for 46 yards.  
**NCAA III NATIONAL DEFENSIVE, DIONTE BEATTY, SO. DB. 5'9, 150. SHENANDOAH UNIVERSITY.** Beatty led the Hornet defense in a 20-10 victory over Waynesburg. Beatty set a school record and USA South Conference record with four interceptions in the game. He also added six solo tackles, assisted on four others and had a sack on a fourth down which set up the game-winning score. Beatty's fourth and final interception came in the endzone to thwart a Waynesburg scoring chance.  
**NCAA III NATIONAL DEFENSIVE, MATT KOSTELNIK, JR. SS. 6'1, 200. MOUNT UNION COLLEGE.** Kostelnik scored two defensive touchdowns in Mount Union's 71-14 win over Otterbein. He scored his first touchdown on a bad snap to the punter that he fell on in the endzone, and then intercepted a pass and took it back 24 yards for a touchdown on the very next defensive play. For the game he totaled four tackles (all solo), including two for losses of four yards with one sack for - three yards. He also had a pass breakup.  
**NCAA NATIONAL SPECIAL TEAMS, DUANE ALSTON, SR. DB/KR. 5'9, 170. AVERETT COLLEGE.** Alston had two kickoff returns for 90-plus yards. One was a 90-yard touchdown to put Guilford away in then fourth quarter, the other was a 92-yard return in the first quarter that set up an ?Averett go-ahead touchdown from the four-yard line. For the game he returned five kickoffs for 222 yards (44.4average). He also registered three tackles in Averett's 54-34 win against Guilford.  
**NCAA NATIONAL SPECIAL TEAMS, GEORGE ANDERSON, SR. P/K. 5'9, 190. ROCKFORD COLLEGE.** Anderson had seven punts in the game against Northwestern (MN) for 284 yards. He averaged 40.6 yards per kick and set a school record with a 68 yard punt. He was also 2-for-2 on extra point kicks.  
**NCAA NATIONAL SPECIAL TEAMS, DUSTY COLEMAN, JR. PR. 5'8, 160. MISSISSIPPI COLLEGE.** Coleman returned two punts for 94 yards, including a 74-yard scamper for a touchdown in the first quarter to give the Choctaws a 7-0 lead against nationally-ranked Texas Lutheran. MC went on to defeat Texas Lutheran 28-21 on the road.  
**NCAA NATIONAL SPECIAL TEAMS, JOSH KRAEMER, SO. PR/DB. 6'1, 190. RIPON COLLEGE.** Kraemer sparked the Red Hawks special teams during Ripon's 35-14 road victory over Knox. He returned three punts for 102 yards (34.0 average), including a 56-yard return to the Knox nine-yard line that led to a touchdown two plays later. Kraemer also returned an interception 40 yards, recorded a sack and registered eight tackles in the contest.  
**NCAA NATIONAL SPECIAL TEAMS, TYLER HERSCH, SO. KR/WR. 5'7, 166. MORAVIAN COLLEGE.** Hersch returned four kickoffs for 151 yards (37.8 average) in the Greyhound's 28-23 loss to King's College, including a 92-yard return for a touchdown to finish off the scoring in the fourth quarter. Hersch also caught three passes.  
**NAIA NATIONAL OFFENSIVE, BRAD REIFSNYDER, SR. QB. 6'1, 195. MALONE COLLEGE.** Hector

completed 14-of-28 passes for 170 yards and four touchdowns in the 33-7 win over 9th-ranked Morningside. He also had 10 carries for 30 yards and one more touchdown.  
**NAIA NATIONAL DEFENSIVE, CHAUNCEY CALHOUN, SO. DB. 6'1, 199. VALLEY CITY STATE UNIVERSITY.** Calhoun intercepted three Dakota State passes, returning two of them for touchdowns covering 80 and 81 yards as the Vikings defeated the Trojans 35-7. His three interceptions tied a school record while his 163 return yards and two touchdowns both set school records. He also had two tackles and two pass deflections.  
**NAIA NATIONAL SPECIAL TEAMS, RYAN POLITE, KR/RB. 6'0, 200. EVAANGEL UNIVERSITY.** Polite had two kickoff returns for 103 yards and also returned the opening kickoff 93 yards for a touchdown to help the Crusaders to a 21-14 win over Avila.  
**NAIA NATIONAL SPECIAL TEAMS, JAKE STOLTZ, JR. DB/KR. JAMESTOWN COLLEGE.** Stoltz had three punt returns for 128 yards (32 yard average) and one kick return for 18 yards in the Jimmies 53-0 non-conference win over Mayville State.  
**NAIA NATIONAL SPECIAL TEAMS, AARON VERMILLION, PK. 5'11, 165. NORTHWESTERN OKLAHOMA STATE UNIVERSITY.** Vermillion scored eight of the Rangers 20 points in the 20-0 win over Southern Nazarene. He hit 32-yard and 44-yard field goals to give NWOSU a 6-0 lead. He also had six punts for 164 yards with a long of 54 yards and had four kickoffs that resulted in touchdowns.  
**NAIA NATIONAL ALL-PURPOSE, TREY ERICKSON, JR. RS. 6'0, 215. UNIVERSITY OF SIOUX FALLS.** Erickson had three punt returns for 84 yards, including a long of 41 yards in the Cougars 41-0 win over Briar Cliff. He also totaled 124 yards on seven receptions and 35 yards rushing and one touchdown. For the day he totaled 243 yards on 13 touches. Erickson is averaging 18.8 yards per punt this season as USF is 3-0.  
**NCCAA NATIONAL OFFENSIVE, BRAD REIFSNYDER, SR. QB. 6'1, 195. MALONE COLLEGE.** Hector completed 14-of-28 passes for 170 yards and four touchdowns in the 33-7 win over 9th-ranked Morningside. He also had 10 carries for 30 yards and one more touchdown.  
**NCCAA NATIONAL DEFENSIVE, BRYAN SANDY, SR. LB. 6'2, 230. MARANATHA BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE.** Sandy had 18 tackles in the Crusaders 25-0 win over Crown College. He had eight solo tackles, 10 assisted tackles, 4.5 tackles for loss and one interception returned 33 yards for a touchdown.  
**NCCAA NATIONAL DEFENSIVE, DEREK WHITE, SR. LB. 6'1, 225. NORTH GREENVILLE UNIVERSITY.** White had 14 tackles, including two tackles for a loss of seven yards and one sack for a loss of five yards as NGU defeated NAIA-ranked Cumberland (KY) 35-7.  
**NCCAA NATIONAL SPECIAL TEAMS, MIKE SKVOR, SO. K. 6'0, 165. MALONE COLLEGE.** Skvor, despite windy conditions, nailed all three of his field goals, including a 43-yarder with just 12 seconds remaining to give Malone a 24-21 upset win over No. 5 Saint Xavier. He also was 1-for-1 in point after kicks and averaged 58.2 on six kickoffs with a long of 65 yards and two were touchbacks.
